President's Letter

Greetings Woodworkers,

Our April Meeting -- For our April meeting Tom Hutchinson gave a presentation on exotic local woods, and his friend Lillian gave a presentation on design in woodworking.

Tom's elaborate and detailed outline of his presentation, published in last month's Newsletter, did a much better job than I could of describing what he talked about. He brought numerous samples of various local woods, and discussed a number of local woods of surprising beauty. He also mentioned places that you might not normally think of finding nice wood, including fire wood stacks, storm damage, etc.

As a follow-up, Tom also identified a great website that shows excellent pictures and contains discussions of a couple thousand species of wood. That reference was sent out to the Newsletter email list after the last meeting.

Tom's presentation reflected a lot of time in preparation, and we appreciate all of the knowledge that he imparted. Thank you very much Tom for your presentation.

Lillian Sung, a Taiwanese American, retired art professor, and friend of Tom Hutchinson, gave a presentation on design. Despite her express trepidation, her presentation was very interesting. She spoke of design in ways that as woodworkers we perhaps are unfamiliar.

Reflecting on the Book of Tao, she spoke of design in terms of negative space and positive space. In thinking of a vessel, the void within the vessel is the negative space and the vessel itself represents positive space. The functionality of the vessel is reflected in the negative space, and a designer must understand and focus on the negative space in order to accomplish good design. While this discussion was new to some, it was a very interesting perspective on wood project design.

Lillian also discussed the fact that designs are hidden everywhere, as well as the principle of keeping it simple. We very much appreciate Lillian making this presentation and giving us food for thought. And as her ending and wonderful bedtime story reinforces: Everything is the best arrangement. Thank you Lillian.

Our May Meeting -- Our May meeting is our annual picnic. It will be held on Saturday, May 20th in the Happy Hollow Shelter in Stephens Park. We try to eat around 11:30, so arrive before that, and we should have it wrapped up by 2:00 or so. You will enter Stephens Park off of Broadway. Immediately after entering the

park, make a left turn going up the hill, and proceed to the last shelter. If you are interested, maps and more information about the park are available at the Columbia Parks and Recreation web site.

The MWA provides, and Terry Selby and helpers grill, meat (usually hamburgers and hotdogs). Please bring a side dish (vegetable, dessert, salad etc.) and please bring enough to feed your party and an equal number of guests from Coyote Hill. If you are able to bring your dish in a disposable container, then the Coyote Hill staff can take home any leftovers (I also use a Dollar Store serving spoon for the same reason—but they presumably have serving utensils).

Come as early as you like to enjoy the park and each other. There is a playground close by. There are plenty of tables with bench seats, but you can also bring folding chairs if you want alternative comfortable seating for part of your visit.
