The monthly meeting of the Midwest Woodworkers' Association was held at 6:30 PM on Monday February 26, 2018 at the Boone County Millwork shop. Norm Anderson presided.

Norm announced that there would be two drawings for Cardwell Hardwoods gift certificates at the monthly raffle.

The March meeting will be held at the Boone County Millwork shop and the program will be on woodburning. The April meeting will be a shop tour, and the May meeting will be the club's annual picnic at Stephens Park with the children from Coyote Hill.

With the passing of Dale Andrews, we need a membership chairman. Don Bristow is working on a process to gather member resources. We will try to get photographs of members with their show and tell projects and include them in the monthly newsletter.

Tom Hutchinson asked how many members had things for sale at local businesses. Several have items at the Columbia Art League, Bluestem, and Poppy.

Norm led a brief discussion on the proper way to remove glue squeezout--wipe with a damp cloth or wait for it to dry and scrape. Apparently either is OK but there are firm opinions on both sides of the issue.

There will be a toy workshop at the PET shop at 6:30 PM on Thursday March 1 and a turning workshop at Ernest's house on Thursday March 8.

The treasurer reported that the woodworkers had a bank balance of \$3406 and the woodturners had a bank balance of \$2235.

The evening's program was a presentation from Taylor Toolworks, a local business that is a source of moderately priced, high quality hand tools. They brought a variety of tools available to order from their website including various chisels, rasps, mallets, turning tools,

measuring instruments, squares, straightedges, sharpening equipment, scrapers and burnishers, handsaws, drill bits, and hand planes. Taylor Toolworks then passed out ½" Narex chisels to members of the club.

Following an informative presentation by Taylor Toolworks, the club's annual tool swap was held. Several members went home with new treasurers while others went home with cash to invest in new "must-have" tools.
